Course Description

This course helps students learn and apply the major strategies, concepts, and principles of public speaking. Students should gain both understanding and practice in researching, preparing and delivering speeches. This course covers several of the major varieties of speeches used to address real world situations, including instructing, informing, persuading, and praising.

Course Goals

Students should expect to gain practice and learn the following:

- \diamond Effectively deliver speeches in a number of public forums and formats.
- \diamond Apply the requisite techniques used to research, organize, and script a speech.
- ♦ Perform constructive criticism of peers and public figures.
- \diamond Speak extemporaneously and field questions on prepared topics.
- ♦ Adapt arguments and speaking styles to different audiences.
