Course Description

This course focuses on techniques and methods of writing for clear and effective communication. All major aspects of writing, including brainstorming, thesis formulation, paragraph development, organizing, and revising, are included. Students learn standard conventions of English composition and strategies for adapting writing to audiences and purposes. Students are expected to write several papers, learn to edit their own work, and provide feedback to one another.

Course Goals

Students should expect to gain practice and learn the following:

- ♦ Write with clarity and precision
- ♦ Develop a thesis statement and organize an essay around it
- ♦ Research, find, and use supporting information
- ♦ Adapt prose to different audiences
