Course Description: This course will include an overview of concepts and main theoretical perspectives used in sociology and an application of these theories to the study of social problems. This course will require you to develop your critical analysis skills in viewing multiple social problems in the United States. This course may also briefly cover global social problems and compare them to those found in the U.S. The purpose of this course is to teach students how to examine social problems from a variety of sociological perspectives. It is also the goal of this course to show students the impact of social institutions and social interactions on human behavior in the development of or response to social problems.

Prerequisite: no prerequisite

Course Goals: It is expected that upon completion of this course all students will have either acquired or begun to:

- To begin to be able to gain the ability to <u>think</u> critically.
- To <u>improve</u> oral communication skills by being able to clearly <u>defend</u>, with evidence, one's opinions.
- To acquire a respect for the viewpoints of others.
- To <u>develop</u> the ability to hear and understand the strengths and weaknesses in the arguments of others and in one's own.
- To understand the problems associated with contemporary society.
- To <u>examine</u> societal problems by applying the "sociological imagination".
- To learn to write brief and concise, but thorough analyses.
- To improve and refine their writing and comprehension skills.
