Course Description

This course is an introductory survey to the visual cultures of the Western world, focusing on Prehistory through the Gothic period. Emphasis is placed on the cultural and artistic context surrounding the creation of major works of art, including painting, sculpture, and architecture. By examining characteristic works of art from each period and culture, we will not only discuss the distinctive artistic styles, forms, and aesthetics, but we will also explore the philosophies and traditions that motivated the creation of these works of art. Thus, we will look at these works within their cultural contexts, closely examining the political, social, economic, and religious spheres that define these aspects of visual culture. Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to utilize art historical vocabulary to discuss works of art in terms of the cultures and societies that created them.

Course Expectations

- 1) Recognize the major artists and works of painting, sculpture, architecture, and the social, historical, and artistic context of their development prior to1350CE
- Recognize visually and be able to describe professionally the stylistic features of art and to explain the primary materials and techniques used in the different media
- 3) Know and be able to utilize the basic professional vocabularies of art history
- 4) Be able to critically evaluate professional art historical literature and ideas
- 5) be able to explain a formal analysis and interpretation of an art object with a clear thesis
- 6) Improve reading and oral communication skills.

- 8. We will have a short presentation regarding your teamwork on June29.
