Course Description

This is an introductory course to Sociology - a discipline that studies human behavior and the organizations of society. Sociology is a field of study that examines social, political, and economic phenomena in terms of social structures, social forces, and group relations. The course will cover several important sociological topics, including socialization, culture, and the social construction of knowledge, social inequality, and how sociologists carry out research. Credit: 4-hrs.

The Goal of this course is to convey the distinctive features of the sociological imagination to our students from different disciplinary areas via introducing the basic concepts, methods and theoretical approaches of sociology.

Learning Objectives:

By the end of the course, the students should be able to:

- Describe the sociological perspective and explain its improvement over common-sense reasoning;
- Describe the major sociological theories and the historical context of their creation;
- Apply these concepts and theories to explain contemporary social problems;
- Apply the key concepts highlighted in the course;
- Exercise independent and critical thinking skills;
- Understand of how society shapes us and how we shape our society.

Course Requirements:

This course consists a range of online activities including group learning, lectures, discussions, and video/audio presentations. Students will be evaluated by response papers, attendance, and participation in class, a final paper, and a final presentation.

EVALUATION OF PERFORMANCE: Grades will be determined through the following major performance areas:

Response paper (400 - 500 words) (56%) – you are required to submit a total of **EIGHT** out of nine 1-page response paper throughout the semester. Response papers are critical reflections of the readings and are not a simple repetition of the material; rather, they are designed as a critique and reflection.

Discussion (24%) – Each week you're required to post a question(s) and a comment(s) on the discussion board from the assigned readings. I encourage you to comment and/or answer on your classmates posed questions and comments.

Final/Film Essays (2-3pages ~ 800 - 1000 words) (20%) – You will prepare **1 film essays** on 1 documentary films of your choice from the list that will be provided on first week of class. First, Select 1 documentary films from the list below. Then write an essay that applies the sociological terms, concepts and – if applicable – theories that are covered in the textbook to the film of your choice. For example, when you see examples of individual concepts (such as *socialization, structure, gender role, statuses, conflict theory etc...*) describe the situation from the film and explain how the concept is related to the readings and why it is an example of the concept you have chosen.
