

# **MUSC 171 World Music Cultures**

## **Course Information**

### **Course Description:**

An introductory survey of selected musical traditions, which may include those of Asia, Oceania, Africa, USA, Latin America, and Native America. Topics include song and dance styles, musical instruments, social context and function of performance genres, musical structure, and aesthetic principles. A primary theme is how the "traditional" music's maintain their vitality in new contexts and alongside contemporary styles and genres.

## **Objectives:**

This course is designed to help students expand their knowledge, understanding and appreciation of music of the world. Students will learn to identify some of the distinct characteristics of music from various parts of the world. Stylistic and structural elements, forms, and musical instruments will be explored. In the process, students will also be exposed to diverse cultures. Though the primary focus of the course will be on traditional music, newer developments will also be looked into.



#### **Learning Outcomes:**

- Students will compare a broad range of cultures.
- Students will compare a broad range of musical practices from around the world.
- Students will compare musical instruments from various parts of the world.
- Students will be introduced to diverse performers.

## **Required Text:**

*Worlds of Music: An Introduction to the Music of the World's Peoples*, Fifth Edition by Jeff Todd Titon <u>Important Note</u>: The instructor will also provide additional material.

## Grading:
