COURSE INFO

COURSE MEETINGS: To allow for scheduling flexibility and to respect the array of time zones for students in this international course, live meetings will **not be required**. All lectures will be recorded and made available to students on Blackboard.

COURSE STRUCTURE: Students may work at their own pace during the week. In general, coursework will be due by the end of the day on Mondays [11:59pm (USA, EST) and 23:59 (Beijing)]. Please see the course schedule for suggested deadlines and other details.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course provides an introduction to psychology as a science. Students will become familiar with topics including: principles underlying mental and behavioral processes, biopsychology, sensation and perception, learning, memory, research methodology, psychopathology and human development. Major concepts, terms, and theoretical models in psychology will be evaluated.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- To understand the history of psychology and how it relates to other fields
- To identify, apply, and evaluate psychological theories and concepts
- To understand the different perspectives from which psychologists examine behavior and mental processes
- To gain knowledge and insight regarding the mechanisms responsible for one's thoughts, behaviors, and interactions with others

COURSE POLICIES:

1. Academic Integrity Policy. Students are expected to complete their own, original work and to abide by the college's honor code. Academic dishonesty, including cheating, plagiarism (using someone else's work as your own), inappropriate collaboration, and other misconduct will result in disciplinary action according to the Bridgewater State University Student Handbook. Students who engage in academic dishonesty will be reported to the Office of Academic Affairs and can expect to be withdrawn from the course with an F grade.
2. Live Classes Online Policy. Optional live classes and/or review sessions may be held online. If you decide to participate in a live class, please keep the following in mind:
 - a. **Respect for Others**. Please make every attempt to remove personal distractions (i.e., pets), minimize background noise, and attend class in private, quiet space. Side conversations, phone/internet use, texting, napping, tardiness, driving (don't!), and other unprofessional behaviors are disruptive to an online class. Students who engage in disruptive behaviors will be asked to leave the class.
 - b. **Safety First, No Driving**. It is DANGEROUS to drive a vehicle while attending a live meeting. You are at an increased risk of accidents even if your camera is turned off and you only intend to listen to the lecture. The reason for this is because attention becomes divided when people attempt to multitask. In turn, this means that you are less focused on your driving and your reaction times (i.e., slamming on the breaks, swerving to avoid a collision) become delayed.

For safety reasons, students are prohibited from attending class in any form if they plan on driving at the same time. Students who drive during class or engage in other unsafe will be asked to leave class (Remember: Your safety is more important than this class. ALWAYS!)
3. Exams/Quizzes. Exam/quiz questions will be derived from assigned readings, videos, and lecture. All exams/quizzes must be completed before the assigned date and time unless permission from the instructor has been received before the designated time. It is the student's responsibility to discuss arrangements with the instructor beforehand. With the exception of serious illness or catastrophe, there are no make-ups for missed exams/quizzes.
4. Email. Students are required to check their emails on a daily basis for updates regarding the class schedule & syllabus. Because class may be cancelled due to inclement weather or for other reasons, the college website should also be checked regularly for school closings.

NOTE: *In the event of serious illness, catastrophe, or other equally compelling circumstances (as determined by the instructor), exceptions to any of the course policies may be made. Please contact the instructor if you experience any hardships during the semester.*
